Licking Valley High School is located approximately 10 miles east of downtown Newark, Ohio and 45 miles east of Columbus, Ohio. It is primarily rural in nature, composed of many small family farms as well as increasing housing development around the four villages in the area. LVHS has a professional staff of 40. Thirty percent of the juniors and seniors attend C-TEC, the career-technical school in Licking County. The High School offers a strong college-preparatory curriculum. LVHS uses the term “college-prep” instead of “honors” or “advanced” to designate more rigorous versions of core courses. In an effort to create a college-going culture and to support many of our students who will be first generation college students, LVHS has developed a series of classes to better prepare students and families for college and the workplace. These classes include Freshman Foundations, Financial Literacy and Journey to College.



SERVICE LEARNING: Each LVHS student must complete 30 hours of community service at a non-profit organization during their high school career as a graduation requirement. Students must also write a 2-page reflection paper about their experience.

At LVHS, grades are a measure of what students know and are able to do. Students are assessed on a scale of 1-4 (see performance levels chart) within content standards. Those integer scores from individual standards are averaged to obtain an Overall Academic Average for the class. The final letter grade for a class is converted from the Overall Academic Average (see conversion chart below). AP and College Credit Plus (CCP) Courses are weighted.



GRADE POINT AVERAGES

Grade-point average (GPA) is calculated by multiplying each grade point value by each course credit value, then dividing the sum of the products by the total number of credits attempted. Values from the “Integer Minimum” column come from electronic gradebook software used by the school and are not subject to rounding. Teachers may override the final integer grade at their discretion.
