

ATTENTION PARENTS!!! CONTACT INFORMATION UPDATES ARE IMPORTANT!

As you know, our school secretaries keep contact information on file for all of our students, including home phone, cell phone, and email data for all emergency contacts for each student. It is critical that parents make a special effort to notify their child's school promptly when any contact information for a student changes. The contact information on file is used not only by your child's school, but also by our transportation department in the event that a bus situation requires us to contact you. Also, our Leader Alert instant messaging system uses contact information for any recorded messages sent by the district, such as snow day notifications. We also use email address information for distribution of parent email messages during the school year. It is vital that all these departments have the most current information on file so that we can contact you if the need arises. So, please make sure to call the secretary at your child's school and update them on any phone number or email address changes. Should you have students at more than one building please contact each school to make sure they have the updated information as well. We can only keep our records current based on what our parents provide, and we appreciate your help in making sure your information is up-to-date.

Lunch Charges

Because we never want to see any child go hungry Licking Valley Local Schools allows students to charge their lunch (we do not offer an alternate). The cafeteria does allow charging, but we would prefer that a student's account be prepaid or paid on the day of purchase. You can apply money online by going to **www.EZPay.com**, or you can send money to school with your child (ren).

We have set the following procedures in place to try to keep charges from going into the "Excessive Charge" range.

- When a child's account is in the negative \$2.00 (Primary), \$5.00 (Intermediate), or \$2.25 (Middle School) Leader Alerts are extracted from our NutriKids System and calls (e-mails) are sent once a week.
- Calls and e-mails are made by the Food Service Director, Jan Jennings, when an account reaches \$5 in charges.
- ♦ A letter is mailed (with a free/reduced application) when an account goes into the negative \$20 and is turned over to the Principal's office for collection.
- At \$40 the account is, once again, turned over to the Principal's office for collection.
- When the account reaches \$60 in charges it is turned over to the District Office.

(Leader Alerts are continuously being sent weekly during these steps)

When you receive a Leader Alert, please contact Jan Jennings (740) 763-2433 if you have questions. A "Call Result" report is sent following the Leader Alert. If a number is listed as "Disconnected" or "Other" the school secretary is contacted for verification of e-mail or telephone number. Please keep this information updated with your school secretary.

Grit: A Necessary Ingredient to Success


Jon Sinclair (Poet) said, "Failure is a bruise. Not a tattoo." Failure is not permanent and is something we can learn from at any age. We look at successful students and people in all walks of life and think they have achieved due to exceptional talent or skill. Our perception is that they were born to be able to succeed at a high level. This is most often not the case. Most people, young and old, have excelled and achieved due to hard work, constant effort, and determination despite some failures along their journey. Successful students, athletes, poets, musicians, parents, coaches, and educators all have something in common. That something is called "grit" (resilience, tenacity).

Grit is an attitude that embraces challenges, stepping out of our comfort zones, and never giving up but pushing through the tough times. People with grit take risks, experience failure, and learn from it. Lessons learned at school, in sports, and in life in general can help us overcome many trials and frustrations for years to come.

Michael Jordan (NBA Basketball Legend) describes grit in the following quote: "Obstacles don't have to stop you. If you run into a wall, don't turn around and give up. Figure out how to climb it, go through it, or work around it." Focusing on grit is not to minimize potential or talent. What is important is for students and adults alike to remember that whatever potential we possess remains just potential unless we work very hard to improve and persevere through our frustrations and failures. It takes more than talent to succeed. It takes the right attitude and a willingness to fight the temptation to give up and quit whenever we face a struggle. Angela Duckworth (American Psychologist and Author) says, "Learning grit is like learning anything else: You learn it by doing it."



In the words of Winston Churchill (British Prime Minister), "Success is the ability to go from failure to failure without losing your enthusiasm." 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

Our goal is to lead our athletics program to the highest safety standards for our players," said Megan Scott, Athletic Trainer for Licking Valley.

"We remain committed to the health and welfare of young athletes in competitive sports," says NATA President Scott Sailor, EdD, ATC. "This award recognizes the contributions and commitment of schools across the country that are implementing safe sports policies and best practices to ensure athletes can do what they love best and have the appropriate care in place to prevent, manage and treat injuries should they occur."

In order to achieve Safe Sport School status, as Licking Valley did, athletic programs must do the following:



- Create a positive athletic health care administrative system
- Provide or coordinate pre-participation physical examinations
- Promote safe and appropriate practice and competition facilities
- Plan for selection, fit function and proper maintenance of athletic equipment
- Provide a permanent, appropriately equipped area to evaluate and treat injured athletes
- Develop injury and illness prevention strategies, including protocols for environmental conditions
- Provide or facilitate injury intervention
- Create and rehearse a venue-specific Emergency Action Plan
- Provide or facilitate psychosocial consultation and nutritional counseling/education
- Be sure athletes and parents are educated of the potential benefits and risks in sports as well as their responsibilities
