STUDENT ATHLETES Board Policy #2431

The district would like to remind parents and student athletes that according to Board Policy #2431 students need to achieve a 1.66 GPA in the 4th academic quarter of each school year in order to be eligible for fall sports the following school year. High School students must also have completed 2.5 credits in addition to the 1.66 GPA.



Licking Valley Local Schools Are Tobacco Free

The Licking Valley Board of Education prohibits the use of all tobacco products including but not limited to cigarettes, cigars, pipes, snuff and other smokeless tobacco at all school sponsored student activities by students, staff, visitors, or guests in all school district buildings, property, and vehicles. Tobacco use is also prohibited by students, staff and volunteers at all events away from school property where they represent the school district.

Search for Children with Disabilities

School districts throughout Ohio actively participate in an effort to identify, locate and evaluate all children with disabilities birth through age 21. By disability, we mean conditions such as multiple disabilities, hearing impairment, visual impairment, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, emotional disturbance, cognitive disability, specific learning disability, speech and/or language disability, autism and traumatic brain injury. Many children with disabilities are not visible because they do not function in the main stream of the community. Also, many unidentified children with disabilities are preschoolers. The Title I Reading Program at Licking Valley

Title I is a Federal Aid program through which most Ohio School districts receive funding each year to provide supplemental instruction for those students who qualify. To receive these funds, each state must submit a plan describing:

- What children are expected to know and be able to do:
- The high-quality standards of performance that all children are expected to meet;
- An ongoing record of student progress through assessment.

The Title I funded schools must work to:

- Identify students who are failing, or most-at-risk of failing, to meet state standards in reading or math
- Focus instruction to meet the specific needs of each child
- Develop programs that add to regular classroom instruction
- Involve parents in all aspects of the program.

Our Title I targeted assistance Reading Program provides intensive instruction to help our low-achieving children in grades K-5 master challenging curricula and meet state standards in reading. Our Title I teachers work closely with their students' regular classroom teachers in designing their extra instruction.

Licking Valley Schools are on a 4-week cycle menu. Elementary students will receive a magnetic menu at the beginning of the school year. Color coded card stock menus will be sent home for all Middle and High School students or you can access the menu through the district website: www.lickingvalley.k12.oh.us/DistrictOffice

Licking Valley Local School District offers a *MENU LUNCH* as well as alternate lunches at all schools. Elementary students not wishing to eat from the cycle menu have the option of a daily sack lunch consisting of: *peanut butter and jelly uncrustable or lunch meat sandwich (alternately), fruit, vegetable, treat and milk.* Intermediate students are also offered salads, fruit/vegetable trays and sandwiches. These options are available at the Middle and High School as well as other hot lunch choices. Alternate lunches (Build-A-Lunch Options) are the same price as the menu lunch and are available to all students regardless of lunch status (Free, Reduced, or Full Pay).

Free/Reduced lunch applications can be completed on line by going to www.lickingvalley.k12.oh.us; Parents Link or paper applications are available upon request from the school secretary at each building. A \$5 Cash Lunch Bonus is offered each year to encourage all households to complete the application process.

All school sites are currently using the NutriKids Point-of-Sale system. Online payments for lunch can be done through the District EZPay System or money can be sent to school with your student.

NEW SCHOOL MEAL REQUIREMENTS

Congress passed the Healthy Hunger Free Kids Act last year. As a result, USDA has released new nutritional meal requirements that all districts must meet. These

new federal rules are mandated for the 2012-2013 school year. Knowing that changes were likely to take place, Licking Valley Food Service has already been gradually making many of these changes.

Biggest Changes:


- Students now will be required to have 1/2 cup fruit or vegetables on their tray for it to count as a full (reimbursable) meal.
- We are now limited as to how much meat/meat alternate (cheese, yogurt, etc.) and grains we can offer. This means main entrees may not be as large as they have been. Remember, though, that there are more fruits and vegetables available than there have been.

What We're Already Doing:

- Half of all grains offered must be whole grain. Almost all of our grains offered already meet this requirement.
- We must offer vegetables from the following groups each week: dark green, orange/red, and legumes. We then have the option to include starchy and other vegetable. We implemented this change with last year's menu, so students won't see a noticeable difference.
