Mackenzie Butler finished her senior season with her 2nd All-Ohio finish in the 1600 meter run in the last two years. She was 8th with a season best 5:08.22.

Mackenzie holds school records in 5 individual events (Indoor: 800, 1600; Outdoor: 800, 1600, 3200) and 1 relay (middle medley), earned 1st Team MSL all 4 years, 1st Team Central District the last 3 years, MSL Scholar-Athlete as a Junior and Senior, and is the only LV female athlete to earn 1st Team All-Ohio in 2 sports - Track ('12 and '13) and Cross Country ('12). Mackenzie accepted a full ride scholarship to study nursing and continue her running career at Morehead State.

# The Title I Reading Program at Licking Valley

Title I is a Federal Aid program through which most Ohio School districts receive funding each year to provide supplemental instruction for those students who qualify. To receive these funds, each state must submit a plan describing:

- What children are expected to know and be able to do;
- The high-quality standards of performance that all children are expected to meet:
- An ongoing record of student progress through assessment.

The Title I funded schools must work to:

- Identify students who are failing, or most-at-risk of failing, to meet state standards in reading or math
- Focus instruction to meet the specific needs of each child
- Develop programs that add to regular classroom instruction
- Involve parents in all aspects of the program.

Our Title I targeted assistance Reading Program provides intensive instruction to help our low-achieving children in grades K-5 master challenging curricula and meet state standards in reading. Our Title I teachers work closely with their students' regular classroom teachers in designing their extra instruction.





The Licking Valley Schools Transportation Department handles daily transportation to and from school each day for an average of 1,750 students. The fleet consists of 26 buses, 4 of which are spares. The oldest bus was purchased in 1998, and our newest bus was purchased in 2013. The bus with the most miles currently has 332,542 miles. The district has a total of 21 bus routes each day; consisting of 19 high school, middle school, elementary, and 2 routes for handicapped, special education and preschool. The fleet runs an average of 2080 miles per day, for an annual average of 359,822 miles. During the 2012-13 school year the fleet also ran trips totaling 28,378 miles for the following purposes:


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up free paper printable books to read during their meal or to take home.

Varicella	<u>K-3</u>	
(Chickenpox)	Two (2) doses of varicella vaccine must be administered prior to entry. Dose 1 must be administered on or after the first birthday. The second dose should be administered at least three (3) months after dose one (1); however, if the second dose is administered at least 28 days after first dose, it is considered valid.	
	Grade 4-7 One (1) dose of varicella vaccine must be administered on or after the first birthday.

enise spent two weeks as an extern at Licking County Job and Family Services (LCJFS). She spent

a week with Angela Carnahan in Income Maintenance and a week with Bruce Anderson in Child Protective Services.

During her time with Income Maintenance, Denise learned valuable information about the process for applying for different services such as food assistance, medical assistance and emergency cash assistance. In addition, she spent time at Opportunity Links located on East Main Street. She gathered information on the different services available to children and high school students. Also of value, she learned about all of the services available to high school graduates and adults who are seeking long term employment in Licking County provided by The One Step program.

The second week she shadowed the case workers through Child and Adult Protective Services. She was able to observe the process from the initial reference call to LCJFS through the decision making process and beyond. She also learned about the philosophies and policies that go into the decision making process. She also had the opportunity to learn more about foster care and adoption services.

Denise can use this information in her classroom and community. Through her experiences she can assist students and community in the employment search. She can talk with students and adults about the places, services and policies LCJFS offers to any Licking County resident to may need help with job search and/or daily assistance.

In addition, she can also direct and explain the process for making referrals to Child Protect Services about any concern the community may have regarding child welfare.

Overall, it was a valuable experience that she only could have received by participating in the STEP program.
