

STUDENT ATHLETES

Board Policy #2431

The district would like to remind parents and student athletes that according to Board Policy #2431 students need to achieve a 1.66 GPA in the 4th academic quarter of each school year in order to be eligible for fall sports the following school year. High School students must also have completed 2.5 credits in addition to the 1.66 GPA.

The Title I Reading Program at Licking Valley

Title I is a Federal Aid program through which most Ohio School districts receive funding each year to provide supplemental instruction for those students who qualify. To receive these funds, each state must submit a plan describing:

- What children are expected to know and be able to do;
- The high-quality standards of performance that all children are expected to meet;
- An ongoing record of student progress through assessment.

The Title I funded schools must work to:

- Identify students who are failing, or most-at-risk of failing, to meet state standards in reading or math
- · Focus instruction to meet the specific needs of each child
- Develop programs that add to regular classroom instruction
- Involve parents in all aspects of the program.

Our Title I targeted assistance Reading Program provides intensive instruction to help our low-achieving children in grades K-5 master challenging curricula and meet state standards in reading. Our Title I teachers work closely with their students' regular classroom teachers in designing their extra instruction.

By disability, we mean conditions such as multiple disabilities, hearing impairment, visual impairment, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, emotional disturbance, cognitive disability, specific learning disability, speech and/or language disability, autism and traumatic brain injury. Many children with disabilities are not visible because they do not function in the main stream of the community. Also, many unidentified children with disabilities are preschoolers. A Critical Key to Your Student's Success

As we get ready to begin a new school year, I would like to address a recurring problem: student attendance. I'll share some information and suggestions from **The Parent Institute**, <u>www.parent-</u> <u>institute.com</u>. Research shows that attendance is the single most important factor in school success. Why? You may have named various other factors as most important. Learning builds day by day. When a child misses school, they miss a day of learning. Schools are responsible for teaching children, but they can't do so if the child is not at school.

Children who are in school most of the time also do better on standardized tests. Being late for school can affect learning too. A student who is late 10 minutes every day will miss 30 hours of instruction during the year. Students can never get back the most important things from the school day: the discussions, the questions, the explanations by the teacher, and the thinking that makes learning come alive.

Here are a few ways to improve your child's attendance:

- * Discuss with your child about why their attendance at school is important.
- * Avoid scheduling trips and appointments during school hours when possible.
- * Talk with your child about what happened at school each day.
- * Support the school rules and consequences for attendance and tardiness.
- * Don't accept excuses for why your child must miss or be late to school.

A child's success in school depends on being in school and developing a solid background of knowledge and skills. Regular school attendance can be the catalyst for acquiring that necessary knowledge and critical skill set.

The Licking Valley Schools Transportation Department handles daily transportation to and from school each day for an average of 1,540 students.

- The fleet consists of 26 buses, 4 of which are spares.
- The oldest bus was purchased in 1998, and our newest bus was purchased in 2012.
- The bus with the most miles currently has 339,694 miles on it.
- The district has a total of 21 bus routes each day; consisting of 19 high school, middle school, elementary, and 2 routes for handicapped, special education and preschool.
- The fleet runs an average of 1,917 miles per day, for an annual average of 333,563 miles.
- During the 2013-14 school year the fleet also ran trips totaling 25,051. miles for the following purposes:



Immunization Summary for School Attendance

VACCINES	FALL 2015 IMMUNIZATIONS FOR SCHOOL ATTENDANCE	
DTaP/DT Tdap/Td Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis	K Four (4) or more of DTaP or DT, or any combination. If all four doses were given before the 4 th birthday, a fifth (5) dose is required. If the fourth dose was administered at least six months after the third dose, and on or after the 4 th birthday, a fifth (5) dose is not required.* 1-12 Four (4) or more of DTaP or DT, or any combination. Three doses of Td or a combination of Td and Tdap is the minimum acceptable for children age seven (7) and up. Grades 7-12 One (1) dose of Tdap vaccine must be administered prior to entry.**	
POLIO	K-5 Three (3) or more doses of IPV. The FINAL dose must be administered on or after the 4 th birthday regardless of the number of previous doses. If a combination of OPV and IPV was received, four (4) doses of either vaccine are required.*** Grades 6-12 Three (3) or more doses of IPV or OPV. If the third dose of either series was received prior to the fourth birthday, a fourth (4) dose is required; If a combination of OPV and IPV was received, four (4) doses of either vaccine are required.	
MMR Measles, Mumps, Rubella	K-12 Two (2) doses of MMR. Dose 1 must be administered on or after the first birthday. The second dose must be administered at least 28 days after dose 1.	
HEP B Hepatitis B	K-12 Three (3) doses of Hepatitis B. The second dose must be administered at least 28 days after the first dose. The third dose must be given at least 16 weeks after the first dose and at least 8 weeks after the second dose. The last dose in the series (third or fourth dose), must not be administered before age 24 weeks.	
Varicella (Chickenpox) NOTES:	K-5 Two (2) doses of varicella vaccine must be administered prior to entry. Dose 1 must be administered on or after the first birthday. The second dose should be administered at least three (3) months after dose one (1); however, if the second dose is administered at least 28 days after first dose, it is considered valid. Grade 6-9 One (1) dose of varicella vaccine must be administered on or after the first birthday.	

- Vaccine should be administered according to the most recent version of the Recommended Immunization Schedules for Persons Aged 0 Through 18 Years or the Catch-up Immunization Schedule for Persons Aged 4 Months Through 18 Years Who Start Late or Who Are More Than 1 Month Behind, as published by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices. Schedules are available for print or download at http://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/recs/schedules/default.htm.
- Vaccine doses administered ≤ 4 days before the minimum interval or age are valid (grace period). Doses administered ≥ 5 days earlier than the minimum interval or age are not valid doses and should be repeated as age-appropriate. If MMR and Varicella are not given on the same day, the doses must be separated by at least 28 days with no grace period.
- For additional information please refer to the Ohio Administrative Code 5101:2-12-37 for Child Care, Head Start, Pre-School and the Ohio Revised Code 3313.67 and 3313.671 for School Attendance and the ODH Director's Journal Entry (available at www.odh.ohio.gov, Immunization: Required Vaccines for Childcare and School). These documents list required and recommended immunizations and indicate exemptions to immunizations.
- Please contact the Ohio Department of Health Immunization Program at (800) 282-0546 or (614) 466-4643 with questions or concerns.

* Recommended DTaP or DT minimum intervals for Kindergarten students: four (4) weeks between doses 1-2 and 2-3; six (6) month minimum intervals between doses 3-4 and 4-5. If a fifth dose is administered prior to the 4th birthday, a sixth dose is recommended, but not required.

** Pupils who received one dose of Tdap as part of the initial series are not required to receive another dose. For students in 11th or 12th grades, one dose of Td (Tetanus and diphtheria) is acceptable. Tdap can be given regardless of the interval since the last Tetanus or diphtheria- toxoid containing vaccine. DTaP given to patients age 7 or older can be counted as valid for the one-time Tdap dose.
