

1:1 COMPUTING

In about eight months, Licking Valley High School will be taking the revolutionary step of putting a netbook computer in the hands of every student, grades 9-12. There are very few school districts – especially in Ohio – that are taking this step.

We feel like our move to 1:1 computing (the term we use to describe the concept) will transform your child's school experience, and help us move toward a more inquiry-based educational concept in which students can gain a larger measure of control over their own learning.

The purpose of this article is to pass along the top four pieces of information about our program that parents need to know right now:

- 1) We want a working netbook in every student's hands, every hour of every day, connected at school to a dependable wireless network and flawless, fast internet connection, and we're taking steps to ensure that happens. We've upgraded our wireless network, and we're selecting a hardy, student-tough computer.
- 2) We're listening to student and parent input as we make our choices:
 - a. Parents have said "Get rid of the 50-pound book bag!" so we're making every effort to use digital texts. We may not get to our goal of digitizing 100% of our paper textbooks, but we'll get as close as we can.
 - b. Parents tell us: "Help us control what our kids do on the computer at home." We are designing mandatory parent training sessions for next summer / fall, and our goal is to give you the tools you need to fulfill your responsibility as a parent. Our current choice of netbook comes with software installed that allows parent control of software and internet at home, too.
 - c. Students have told us: "Not everyone has internet access at home." While we are largely focusing on software choices that are web-based, we're also taking steps to give every student the ability to access the tools and texts they need at home. We're also exploring ways we can keep our building open outside normal school hours, so students can utilize our network and printing resources.
 - d. Students have said: "We want to keep the same computer, every year." This makes sense, and we think students will take better care of a computer they know they're going to use for multiple years...so we're going to make that happen.
- 3) There is going to be a cost associated with the program. Currently, our thinking is that a charge of \$50 per year will ensure your child has access to a working netbook computer every day. When there's a problem like a computer virus or software malfunction, we'll give them a spare. If their battery stops charging, they'll walk out of our help desk room with a new one and be back in class in no time. The \$50 helps us make the program possible it makes it possible for us to have spares, spare batteries, etc. and it is also like an insurance premium in that all minor repairs will be covered. *Most importantly, even in the case of a lost or sto*
 - len netbook, or catastrophic hardware failure, the ceiling for parental financial responsibility is \$200. As our current projected netbook cost per unit is more than \$500, this insures parents against a huge financial liability.
- 4) Once your student has a computer, they're going to use it. Whether it's handing in homework, taking an online quiz, typing / writing notes in class, or creating a video project, your student is going to use the netbook. Our commitment to professional development for teachers ensures that each of them will have the knowledge and skills they need to leverage this tool. Teachers will train students to use the software they'll need.

5) We're going to use a combination of existing and best-in-class software to ensure students are using tools they'll later use in college or career. Since parents are accustomed to Edline, we'll continue using it. We've chosen Google Apps for e-mail and collaboration, and we'll keep the Microsoft Office applications that our kids are learning at the lower grade levels.

Effective Immediately - New Drug & Alcohol Testing

Licking Valley High School and Middle School have utilized a drug- and alcohol-testing program for several years in connection with its extracurricular activities. Our stance has been that this policy – and the preseason and random tests that go along with it – give our student-athletes a reason to say "No" when they are in situations where drugs and alcohol are available.

Traditionally, we have used our random samples to test for drugs, and the test for alcohol has been used sparingly as a 'probable-cause' test, as permitted by the policy. These tests have been rare.

We all know that alcohol use among teenagers is at least as big a problem – if not a bigger problem – than drug use. We know this anecdotally because of what we hear, and more importantly we learn it is the case when we survey students anonymously. The PRIDE survey is one example of such evidence.

If you're curious, here is the situation in which students are most-frequently using alcohol:

- 1) On the weekend.
- 2) At a friend's house.
- 3) Parents may or may not be present

Beginning with the winter sports season – now in progress – we will be using a new test as part of our random panels that can detect alcohol use for several days prior to the test. We will also use this test for 'probable cause' tests that come from our having reasonable suspicion of alcohol use.

Our interest in telling everyone about it first is this: The most important (and effective) aspect of the program is its deterrent effect. We don't want to catch kids drinking...we want to keep them from drinking in the first place. Please join us in keeping our kids safe by enforcing behavior expectations that keep them out of situations where drugs and alcohol are being used.

State Reviewers Praise Valley School District

The Licking Valley Local School District undergoes audits and reviews all the time, just like other school districts, to ensure all students are being educated effectively.

A recent audit of the district's special education programs turned out to be so much more, however, and the district as a whole ended up being called "crazy great" by state auditors.

The audit was compiled the first week of December, and in addition to special education, covered preschool and the gifted program. More than 30 staff members were interviewed, as well as 10 parents of children in the special education program.

But the review actually an was in-depth examination of the district's entire instructional process, which Superintendent David Hile said made the process and results so much more valuable. One of the reviewers told Hile and Jan Clayton, director of pupil services, in the exit meeting that Licking Valley was "awesome."

"The school district is 'crazy great,'" Hile quoted from the review. "You're doing things here, instructionally and with technology, that other school districts can't even envision. You have implemented best practices in every facet of your instructional program."

In a letter to all staff members, Hile congratulated everyone on the great job they are doing on a daily basis to focus on improving instruction.

"These people, who review school districts all over the state of Ohio, were in awe of what is happening here in little ol' Licking Valley," Hile wrote. "You blew them away. This kind of validation, from an objective third party, for what we do every day and for our focus on our vision, and for our relentless pursuit of our vision, and for our passion for this district and its children, is hard to come by."

The review also commented on the Flying Colors Preschool Program for the district's preschoolers, saying it is "cutting edge," providing services preschoolers are not getting anywhere else.

Clayton said the goal always is 100 percent compliance with the law and that there always is room for improvements.

"We were so excited that they recognized the fact that we are working hard to make improvements," Clayton said. "The great part is that we do not have a systemic problem."
