Eighth Grade Gettysburg Trip

Another successful year with 202 people attending the trip. 135 eighth graders along with 67 adult chaperones left the middle school Sunday morning at 6:00 A.M. The students started their learning experience with two ranger programs at Antietam battlefield, "Flags that talk," and "Cannoneers to your Post," where students learned how to send messages to each other using flags and how a Civil War artillery battery operated a cannon.



They also toured the battlefield learning about the three phases of fighting that occurred at Antietam. They spent Monday touring Gettysburg learning about the three day battle. They had a scavenger hunt through the visitors center museum and toured the Shriver House learning the story of a family that was living in Gettysburg during the fighting that occurred



there. Tuesday of the trip was spent in Washington DC where they started the day at Arlington National Cemetery. At 10:15 A.M. the students got to witness Luke Kzlowski, Haylee Zigan,



Liz Schneider, and Kirsten Wills have the honor of placing a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknowns. After leaving Arlington, the students and parents spent the remainder of the day touring the Smithsonian's, the Memorials, The Holocaust Museum, and Capitol building just to name a few. The last day of the trip was spent touring the Gettysburg National Cemetery where many recited the Gettysburg address and then spent the last couple hours picking up some last minute souvenirs. The group arrived back at the middle school about 7:00 P.M. Wednesday night. It was fun to see many of the students wearing their Gettysburg or Washington DC shirts. Thanks again to everyone who made this unique learning opportunity possible for the eighth grade students.


