Licking Valley Local Schools Calamity Days

Although Licking Valley School District has gone to a school year based on hours, we set our hours to include 5 calamity days just as in the past, thus, just as in the past, if we utilize 6 or more calamity days we will have to make them up. The District did this to protect student instructional time.

The District has used eight (8) calamity days.

Monday, November 17 Tuesday, February 17
Thursday, January 8 Thursday, February 19
Monday, January 12 Friday, February 20
Monday, January 26 Tuesday, February 24

The District has also had five days of a 2-Hour delayed start time:

Tuesday, January 6 Monday, February 2
Friday, January 9 Thursday, February 5
Friday, January 30

Based upon Policy 8210 the Licking Valley School District will make up two days of missed instruction on March 30th and March 31st, the first two days of Spring Break and the third day on June 3rd at the end of the school year.

Spring Break will be April 1st, 2nd, 3rd.

Contingency Plan For Make-Up Days

If make-up days are needed, this is our contingency plan based on Policy 8210:

1st priority - The spring Parent-Teacher Conferences Comp. Day (02/13/2015) and/or Presidents' Day (02/16/2015), if applicable.

2nd priority - the first two days of Spring Break will be utilized (3/30/2015-3/31/2015).

3rd priority - days will be added to the end of the school year (beginning 06/03/2015).

Licking Valley's stars took care of business Monday night, February 23rd but the rest of the Panthers made the difference in putting Valley back on top in the county.



The Panthers had five champions win the Licking County
League title on their home mats. Valley finished with 347 points,
ahead of Watkins Memorial's 309 and Utica's 264. Defending champion Granville, competing with a small roster, was
fourth with 202.


Valley was wrestling without returning state qualifier Ethan Fout, who is out with an illness. The Panthers, who were

Mid-State League-Ohio Division champions from 2009-12 and county champions from 2009-11, more than made up for the absence, placing eight in the top three of their class.

"It was pretty impressive," Valley sophomore Jake Martinez said. "Our team wrestled really well. (Coaches Jeremy Tate and Roy Whisner) were telling us to set goals for ourselves and made us bust our butts."

Martinez (138) had three pins and a technical fall before beating Johnstown's Hayden Bullard 19-7 in the finals. Jaqui VanMeter (Hwt.) pinned three of his four opponents to win.

"Oh my gosh, it feels so awesome," VanMeter said. "We were worried about (Watkins) the whole time, and we found out Utica had only one weight class missing so we were worried about them."



Addison Fogle (106) opened the finals with a victory against Utica's Max Seifert, Gunner Carpenter (120) had two pins before beating Northridge's Forest Belli 20-8 in a battle of talented freshmen, and Garret Robinson (182) had a first-period pin of Newark Catholic's Connor Sheehan in his final match.

"Last year we knew it was going to be really hard to win it with not having five weight classes," VanMeter said. "This year, when we found we had a couple people sick, we just kicked it into high gear. We won a lot of key matches today, and I think that's what won us the tournament."

career connections

Research has shown that parents and family members have the greatest influence on a child's career decisions. Strengthen your influence by building Career Connections at home using these examples.

GRADES K-5*

Begin to have short talks at home about work and jobs that include why doing well at school is important. Encourage your child to think about what he or she might want to do in the future.

Share books together that show different jobs. Talk about examples in your family and community that connect to the story.

Consider taking your child to work and share with them the jobs at your workplace and the types of tasks you do on a regular basis. If this isn't an idea that works for you, consider a relative or family friend who may be able to take your child to work.

Participate in a career fair or present to your child's class by sharing what you do for work, what things you were interested in as a child and helpful tips for anyone interested in your career field.

GRADES 6-8

Begin to talk with your child about strengths and interests. Consider asking "what are the things at school you enjoy most?" and "what things do you feel you do really well?" Share your own experiences and strengths.

Share websites or books with your child that focus on career interests or personal strengths. Talk about things you enjoy doing and things you're good at—either at work or in your personal life.

Visit the OhioMeansJobs K-12 website with your child to discover career interests and explore various pathways. Begin discussing options for the future such as high school programs and career goals.

Begin to talk about scheduling for high school. Review graduation requirements and explore what classes your child's school offers.

GRADES 9-12

Begin to talk about career pathways and explore possible elective classes that your child's school offers. Review your high school's graduation requirements and the classes your student is interested in.

Revisit OhioMeansJobs K-12 and review the education and training requirements for careers of interest. This information will be helpful when choosing training programs and college majors.

Talk with your child's counselor and teachers

- Career exploration opportunities such job shadowing, volunteering, mentoring, youth-apprenticeships, co-ops and internships;
- Earning college credit in high school through dual enrollment, career tech programs and advanced placement; and
- Financial aid options such as grants, scholarships and loans and completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

Consider keeping a calendar or timeline with important dates and deadlines, such as application due dates and scholarship deadlines.


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

New Educational Options Program at LVHS

We are excited to announce that under our Educational Options Policy, the Licking Valley Schools is launching a new Educational Options program. This program will provide new and exciting opportunities for all LVHS students. We have partnered with ACE Digital Academy, an online curriculum and education provider to offer up to 200 online courses to our high school students. This program is designed to meet two basic needs. One need is to help the roughly 7% of our students who do not graduate each year. Many of these students are, for one reason or another, unable to succeed in the traditional high school instructional program and environment. This online option will provide them with an alternative to the traditional high school program and give them another avenue to earn their Licking Valley High School diploma. We would like to bring back to Licking Valley our students who are currently enrolled in other online, community and charter school programs, and students who have dropped out of LVHS but who really want a diploma from Licking Valley High School. If you know a former LV student who didn't graduate, please share this information with them. Licking Valley currently loses almost \$350,000.00 annually to community and charter schools such as Newark Digital Academy when our students drop out and enroll in those schools, and the vast majority of them never acquire a diploma of any kind.

The other need is to offer additional internet—based elective courses to all of our students. These electives include various foreign languages such as French, German, Japanese, Latin and Mandarin Chinese. There are also electives such as art history, business and technology, Microsoft Office Software courses, career exploration and various Advanced Placement (AP) courses not currently available at the school. There is also an online ACT Preparation course available through this program. We will also be able to offer credit recovery

Abraham Lincoln Gettysburg Address November 19, 1863



On February 21, four teams from Licking Valley Middle School STEM Club took part in STEMfest at the Works in Newark. The Works in Newark sponsors an event for Middle School and High School students each year called STEMfest in an effort to connect industry, education and community. STEMfest is centered around Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics and provides students with real-world problem solving challenges and materials and encourages teams to find the best solutions.



Students present their solutions to a live audience and panel of judges. Awards are presented to teams with top honors, and all students receive certificates to add to their career passports. STEMfest allows students to gain valuable insight into future careers and participation can even lead to wonderful internship opportunities with local businesses.



The Panthers of London Team consisted of Meghan Nelson and Ellie Nethers. Shrub & Co. consisted of Logan Nethers, Nora Christy, Sarah Stephens, Luke Snelling, and Jonathan Gee. The Architecture teams were challenged to research and construct the best possible bridge using toothpicks and glue. The Panthers of London built a bridge holding over 34 pounds and won the Architectural Aesthetics award. Both teams did a tremendous job with their bridges and presentations.

The Piggy Pro Team consisted of Josh Green, Ashton White, and Mason McWilliams. The Solar Power team was challenged to use cardboard, tape, paint and other everyday items to construct the most efficient Solar Thermal Heater to heat a room.

The Piggy Pro Team consisting of Josh Green also entered the 3D Printing Challenge. Teams were challenged to design an egg that would hold 3 Starburst candies and withstand the most weight. Josh designed and constructed an egg that held over 300 pounds and took 1st Place for his innovative design!


