# **Introducing Leader Alert!!!**

Leader Alert is a new product that will allow Licking Valley Schools to automatically contact groups of staff and parents via phone and/or email in the event that a message of some type needs to be relayed. Leader Alert gives us the ability to send a

voice or email message to every parent in our district with information about any situation that might arise. This includes snow days, early releases, and any emergencies that might occur in our schools. Here's how it works: We have taken the information parents have provided us and created a contact list for every

number, parent cell phone number, and email address. We're loading this data into the Leader Alert system, and once it's ready we'll be able to send messages as needed. <u>To test this ser-</u> vice we are going to attempt to send a voice

message to the parent phone numbers

and an email message on Thursday. November 13<sup>th</sup>, at approximately 5:30P. M. When the message is sent, your phone will ring, and once you answer and say hello you'll hear a recorded message from Superintendent Hile. You'll be asked after the message is completed to press 1 on your phone to

acknowledge the call. In addition, you should receive an email message. You don't need to reply to the email. That's all there is to it. We

#### LVHS Band Scores High



Congratulations to the Licking Valley Marching Band for their OUT-STANDING performances at competitions on Satur-

day, Oct. 18, 2008. The band performed at Newark's White Field and New Philadelphia's Woody Hayes Stadium. Needing SUPERIOR (I) ratings in at least four out of seven categories for a trip to the State Marching Band Finals, the band received SUPERIOR ratings in three categories, missing three other categories by 1.5 points or less. The band's final score at New Philadelphia of 232.05 is the band's highest total in three years. This performance places the Licking Valley Marching Band in the top 20% of competitive marching bands from schools with similar enrollment in the state of Ohio.
