Recently, a committee of Licking Valley community stakeholders met to review the requirements of a grant opportunity to create safe routes to school for our children that is a joint venture between the Licking Valley Schools and Hanover Village. In order to make this happen and to acquire the necessary federal funding, we must develop a School Travel Plan. "The School Travel Plan is a written document that outlines a community's intentions for enabling students to engage in active transportation. Active transportation is traveling by means other than motor vehicle or bus to and from school. This is accomplished by reducing car trips, increasing walking and bicycling and by making the walking and bicycling environment safer. By completing the school travel plan, our community will know the steps needed to integrate Safe Routes to School (SRTS) into the community. The Federal Highway Administration funds the SRTS program and ODOT administers it." (School Travel Plan Guidelines, Ohio Department of Transportation).

The purpose of our recent committee meeting was to review the need for a school travel plan and the benefits of constructing safe routes to school for our students who are within a two-mile radius of the schools, which may mean the construction of sidewalks and other necessary pedestrian infrastructural improvements. I want to make it very clear to everyone that this initiative is not something we are pursuing in order to reduce our school bus service to our students or the number of bus routes offered within the two mile radius.

The committee also wrote a mission statement establishing the purpose and function of the LV school travel plan, which is a grant requirement.

The SRTS Mission Statement reads:

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"The Licking Valley area, a growing, semi-rural community, will provide safe and healthy pedestrian options for students to access our centrally located school facilities."

Another important requirement of the grant application is the completion of student and parent walk-ability and bike-ability surveys. Attached, you will find the surveys we are asking you to complete and return to your child's school as soon as possible. These surveys are essential to the completion of the School Travel Plan and the grant application. I hope you will take the time to complete and return these surveys and ensure that your child does the same. With your help, we may be able to create safe and healthy pedestrian access for you and your family from your neighborhood to the Licking Valley Local Schools and throughout the LV community. Thank you in advance for your assistance with this project!
