As you know, Melissa has taken the lead with this project for the past several years, She has led yearly meetings with grade level representatives from K-5, and has been instrumental in the planning and execution of the vision for the park. She has organized fundraisers and coordinated K-5 grade level activities including a kickoff celebration for grades K-5. She has spent countless hours applying for grants and looking for ways to expand the vision of the park to include additional outdoor learning opportunities for all students. Under her leadership, the park now has raised bed gardens for each grade level to utilize for learning opportunities according to their curriculums. We also added picnic tables with umbrellas for classes to use. I am proud to nominate Melissa DeHart for this welldeserved award.



FFA Soils Teams Compete

The Licking Valley FFA recently competed in Licking County soils contest held at the Infirmary Mound Park near Granville September 22. Jordan Ellis placed as top individual in rural soils and Dylan Carr received top honors in the urban category. Students

on the judging team must identify slope, erosion of topsoil, soil texture, bedrock restrictions and air and water movement to determine the optimum conservation practices needed for a particular site. Both teams competed at district competition September 27th where the Urban team placed 6th and the rural placed 4th. Emily Priest (rural) and Fischer White (urban) were top scorers for the team with a 12th and 19th placing. The rural team qualified for State competition October 8th. Both teams will be recognized for their efforts at the Licking County Soil and Water Conservation District held at The Grove by the River November 9th.

Parents of LVHS students may be frustrated with new state testing and graduation requirements and you are not alone. Administrators and teachers are equally disturbed by the roll-out of new tests and the graduation-points scheme.

Students at all grade levels take state standardized tests, but LV freshmen, sophomores and juniors are taking tests that have implications for whether or not they can earn a diploma and graduate on time. You may have heard about 'Safe Harbor' legislation that shields districts, buildings and teachers from the consequences of test results; very few people know that high school students are left exposed in the new system – and they have the most to lose.

At the high school, fewer than 60% of our juniors have qualified for graduation as of today. Despite our re-testing more than 120 kids on 200+ tests this summer, passage rates didn't improve much. Many students started this year with fears they won't get a diploma. The anguish felt by these kids and their concerned parents is something we all share.

Almost all of these students passed the classes associated with the tests but are deficient in graduation points and will need to take the tests again. Even though we are teaching to the right standards, there are precious little remediation materials available for students who fail and need to brush up on content and skills. As the Ohio Department of Education recently told us, there is little reason to expect they can improve their scores because **no specific data from their own test results – or school-wide data -- will be made available to schools**. Faced with completely logical questions about "How do we help our kids?" from parents who want to see their students succeed, we are forced to provide wholly-unsatisfying and incomplete answers. We hate to do it, but in this case the finger should be pointed at the legislature and state education bureaucracy.


For its part, the Ohio Department of Education is paralyzed by the lingering effects of our state politicians' botched transition to new standards and assessments. For various reasons, test questions haven't been released to school districts, and we don't know if we're preparing students without having access to them. Our kids are currently aiming at an 'invisible target' on the test.

On the previous state tests – the Ohio Graduation tests -- LVHS staff maximized every available resource to help our students succeed. We taught an aligned curriculum, we used short-cycle assessments aligned with state tests, and most of all, we analyzed detailed data from the Ohio Graduation Tests to great effect. Of these strategies, none compared to analyzing ODE-provided item analysis to see in detail the areas of strength and weakness for OUR kids. In the span of several years, we went from low state test scores to an exceptional passage rate, with the most improvement coming in areas that had been our greatest deficit. As good teachers know, quality feedback is the key to learning. Our new state tests and accountability measures tied to test performance data provide ALL of the negative consequences with NONE of the helpful feedback we need. If the tests and report cards really are about school improvement, they are failing schools miserably as 'teaching' tools.

Sadly, the only thing that will avert what we see as a disastrous consequence is a change in the law at the state level – and that will only come about as a result of community members making their voices heard. When we talk to legislators, they hear the voice of school administrators and teachers and they wonder about (or openly question) our motives. Please call or e-mail your state legislator to tell them it isn't acceptable. They'll listen.



AP Classes: Are They Really Worth It?



As students age and mature, their courses in school become more rigorous. Even with all of the stress that

comes along with these classes, students find themselves constantly challenging their intellect and management capabilities.

A question that arises within many students is if all the stress that comes along with AP classes is really worth it. This becomes an even more apparent matter when evaluating AP test scores at Licking Valley.

In the past five years, passage rates of AP tests in our school have steadily declined. According to a summary presented on College Board, in 2012, 46% of Licking Valley students taking AP classes passed the final exam at the end of the year. In 2016, that percentage had decreased to 25%. This is especial-



ly peculiar considering the number of students taking AP classes at Licking Valley increased from 92 students in 2012 to 121 students in 2016.

Compared to state and national AP passage percentages, Valley seems to trail behind. In 2012, 67% of students in Ohio taking AP exams passed, and in 2016 it was 64%. Nationally, 61% of students passed the exam in 2012, and 60% passed in 2016. These percentages are significantly larger than those Valley claims.

When asked about her opinion on why AP passage rates may be decreasing, senior Lexi Sidwell explains, "I've never passed an AP test and I've passed the classes with an A. The tests are super hard and the teachers move really fast and then you come back to it and you have no idea what you're doing." The fast pace of the class is to be expected, but still serves as an obstacle for many students.

AP teachers throughout the school also have theories for the recent decrease. AP Chemistry teacher, Mrs. Stuckwisch, explains, "Over the past couple of years, I feel like there has been a push for students to take more AP classes. Students who have multiple AP classes may not have the time or willpower to dedicate what they need to for each class."

The intensity of AP classes can be frustrating for students and may discourage them from putting all of their effort into it.

Mr. Weaver also shared his thoughts on the decline: "Another factor in the falling scores, in my opinion, is the expected decline that comes when schools (and teachers) implement something new instructionally. It takes time for measures of success to stabilize, regardless of the impact of the change." Among these changes is the grading system, which has impacted both teachers and students drastically.

Junior Savannah Patterson has high hopes for her AP courses this year. She says, "I think I'm going to do pretty good because I usually do well in higher level classes. As long as I understand the material, I think I'll do pretty well."


The goal of Harptoons is to get kids drawing, creating and imagining. Harptoons delivers this message through books, videos, apps


